other refreshments to be served at the Y. M. H. A. auditorium on Kirkpatrick street. The invited guests will be entertained at the buffet luncheon at the Hotel Woodrow Wilson and throughout the day, "open house" will be observed at the Exempt Firemen's Headquarters on New street.

Many of the clubs and fraternal headquarters have been decorated for the occasion. The Elks Club and the City Hall are resplendent with bunting. - Every business house of the city is urged to display flags tomorrow and to give cordial greeting to the thousands of visitors who will spend the day here.

The visiting firemen will begin arriving in New Brunswick shortly before 10 o'clock and they will proceed to Livingston avenue where they will be assigned their places in the parade which promises to be one of the most spectacular demonstrations held in New Brunswick in many years, excluding the 250th anniversary demonstration.

The dedicatory exercises will be of brief duration at Monument Square. The memorial was completed on Saturday and now awaits unveiling at the close of the parade. These services will be attended by the visiting firemen and thousands of others.

It will be of interest to New Jersey residents to learn that the figure which forms a part of this memorial is the work of a Plainfield sculptor, Grove Porter Hinman. Mr. Hinman has been a resident of Plainfield for over thirty-five years and received his art training in various art schools in New York including two years at the National Academy of Design.

The Elks and Eagles have very graciously turned over their parking spaces to the firemen for the day and after the parade, the apparatuses of the various companies will be parked in these spaces.

MORRISTOWN PAPER CEASES PUBLICATION

(By The Associated Press) MORRISTOWN, Oct. 10—After more than one hundred years of continuous publication first as a weekly and then a daily newspaper, the Morristown Jerseyman, founded October 4, 1926, ceased publication today.

Receiver's sale yesterday netted \$3,600 for various properties of the company. There were no bids for the paper as a going concern.

Samuel P. Hull, of Morristown set up the publication as a two page hand-set weekly in 1826.

The history of the periodical continues with the sale by Hull to A. A. Vance in 1852, who sold a half interest to A. L. Stiles in 1869. Vance retired in 1890 after 38 years with the institution.

After being sold in 1895 to Pier-son and Svydam, it was bought by a group of Morristown businessmen who in 1919 altered the policy of the publication and made it a daily.

Two years ago, Edward S. Little bought the paper and was the owner until yesterday.

The bankruptcy was voluntary and was based on one claim of \$18,000 back salaries due the employees.
