

The earliest record of this family in New England is  
that George Bonham, a widow, married Richard Fletcher  
at Charlestown, Mass. in 1666 and their daughter Hannah  
married a second husband Nathaniel Morton, who no  
doubt belonged to the family of George Morton.

In all probability Nicholas Bonham was a brother  
of George Bonham of Plymouth Colony. George's  
name is in a shippping list of passengers for Virginia  
in 1655. His name appears in a list of those able to  
bear arms at Plymouth in 1643. His wife was Sarah  
Morton, dau. of George Morton, who came over in the  
ship, Ann. She was born in Leyden, Holland, 1617-18.  
A Ruth Bonham married Richard Smyth of Fenton, Mass.  
March 27, 1648. Plymouth Colony records appear to  
show that she and her husband died in 1684. It is  
noteworthy that George Bonham named his daughter Ruth.  
She married Robert Barlow. George Bonham, Nicholas  
Bonham and Ruth Bonham were brothers and sisters. In

of Piscataway, is first recorded at Bantam, Mass.
