Milton Edgar, of Perth Amboy, was in the borough yesterday.

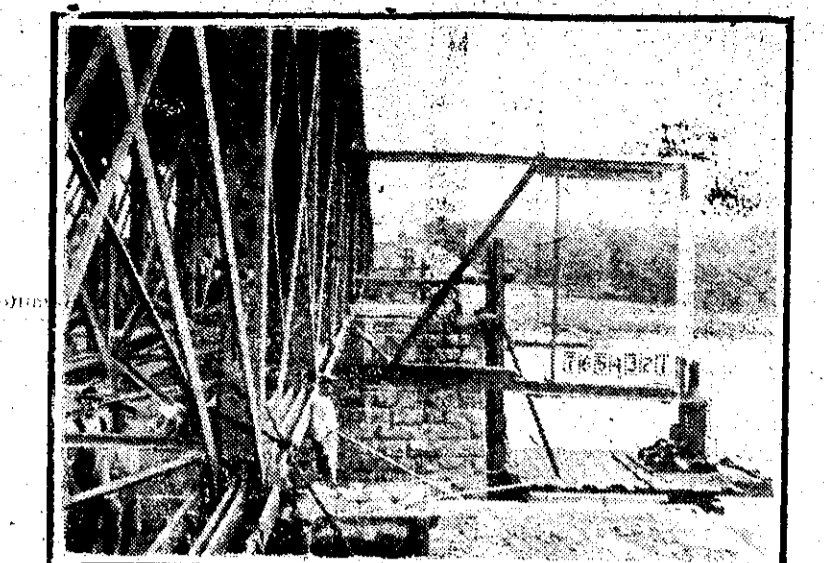

Interesting Picture of the Ingenious Mechanism, Recording the Movement of the Pennsylvania Railroad Bridge.

One of the most interesting features of the bridge moving feat of the Pennsylvania Railroad on Sunday was the 'tell-tale' marks which rose as the bridge was hauled over. The crowds watching these closely; the figures being large enough to be seen for quite a distance. The accompanying cut is a most excellent one of this ingenious part of the bridge moving plans.

BRIDGE MOVING FIGURES.

Official Time of Sunday's Feat Announced by Railroad—Changing Tracks Here.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company's engineers at the Jersey City office gave out corrected figures for the bridge moving yesterday, which will be the official statistics concerning the great feat. These figures are as follows: Actual time taken to move the bridge, 1 minute and 43 1/2 seconds; last westbound train left west end of bridge before moving at 11:56; both ends of westbound tracks cut at 11:57; train 234, eastbound, left east end of bridge at 12:10; both ends of eastbound track cut at 12:11; signal given to take in slack at 12:12; signal to move given at 12:13:30; west end of bridge in place at 12:15:13; east end in place at 12:16:20; both tracks at east end in service at 12:21; both tracks in service at west end at 12:25; first train, No. 1082, went west at 12:44; first train, No. 68, went east at 12:50; time elapsed between time of train No. 234 going east and train No. 1082 going west was 34 minutes; actual time westbound track was out of service, 28 minutes; actual time eastbound track was out of service was 15 minutes.

Changing More Tracks. Now that the bridge has been moved changes are rapidly being made for the progress of the elevation plans. The old westbound track above the George street crossing has now been put to the freight yard track, so that the track formerly used to get into the freight yard can be taken up. The elevation wall goes right down the centre of this track and in front of the tower at Washington street. Changes will continually be made now so that the work can be pushed forward rapidly.
